Overview

Meeting the Need


Most public schools in Sitka's rural Oregon coast communities serve economically disadvantaged families and cannot provide art programming within their standard curriculum. Across the coastal region, over 90% of students qualify for free or reduced meals based on federal income guidelines. Recognizing this gap, Sitka aims to deliver high-quality, free art and STEAM education (science, technology, engineering, art and math) directly to students, enhancing learning experiences, nurturing creativity and self-expression and supporting underserved youth.

2025 Impact

By the 2024-2025 academic year, K-8 Create became the largest rural-serving art education program in Oregon. The program now reaches over 5,000 PreK-8th grade students across three counties—Clatsop, Tillamook, and Lincoln—covering nine public school districts and 17 schools. The 900% growth since 2020 reflects both the demand and the success of providing consistent, high-quality arts education to rural communities, significantly enriching student experiences and expanding educational opportunities across a tri-county region.

Solution

In 2019, Sitka partnered with Community Arts Project (CAP), transitioning CAP's art literacy and classroom arts programs into Sitka's stewardship in 2020. Leveraging Sitka's greater administrative capacity, the K-8 Create program rapidly expanded, transforming CAP's original framework into a comprehensive, regional model for delivering monthly art and STEAM lessons directly to rural schools.

Regional Program Expansion

Responding to strong community demand, K-8 Create grew to serve all five Clatsop County districts and four new Lincoln County schools in 2024–2025. All nine school districts across three coastal counties — Clatsop, Tillamook and Lincoln — now host the program. This expansion represents a 150% increase in reach compared to the prior year and 900% growth since program launch in 2020.

Cultural Connection

K-8 Create fostered cultural connection across our tri-county region, linking students, schools and communities through shared creative experiences. Much like an "everybody reads" program, lessons created a common language of self-expression and curiosity, helping establish a culture where creativity is valued as part of a well-rounded education. This region-wide approach strengthened community identity while ensuring every student had a place in the conversation.

Artist Engagement

K-8 Create showcased a diverse roster of 19 professional artists, including 11 who visited classrooms and schools in person. Oregon-based creators such as Steph Littlebird and Mike Vos joined national and international voices like Gasali Adeyemo (Nigeria/Santa Fe), Maja Sereda (Poland/Seattle), and U.S. Poet Laureate Ada Limón. Through their contributions, lessons in illustration, natural pigments, photography, poetry, textiles and music connected youth and classroom teachers to a wide range of cultural and creative practices.

Access for All

K-8 Create deepened its impact by working hand-in-hand with classroom teachers and support staff. Educators participated alongside their students in monthly lessons, strengthening their own creative confidence while helping ensure every child could take part. Together, we adapted activities to meet the needs of English language learners and students with special learning needs, making sure creative opportunities were accessible to all.

How It Works

Delivery in Schools


K-8 Create takes place during the academic school year. Sitka's Art Instructors based in the communities they serve travel classroom to classroom, leading monthly art and STEAM-integrated lessons designed for each grade level. Classroom teachers and support staff participate alongside students, ensuring lessons are inclusive of English language learners and students with special learning needs. This teaching model allows every child to take part while also building teacher capacity to integrate creativity into the school day.

Curriculum and Feedback

Lessons are inspired by professional artists and art movements chosen with local demographics and cultural relevance in mind. Scheduling takes place at the beginning of the school year, ensuring time is set aside for art in ways that work for classroom teachers. Ongoing evaluation includes student reflections, teacher and administrator surveys, and superintendent-level input, creating a feedback loop that continually strengthens program quality.

Funding Model

K-8 Create is sustained through a shared investment model. Schools make a modest \$4,000 contribution that affirms local buy-in, while keeping the program affordable. The majority of program costs are underwritten by private foundations and donors, matching school funds \$7 to \$1, making it possible for every lesson, supply kit and teaching artist to reach classrooms free of charge to students and families, including supplies. As demand grows, Sitka is working to secure multi-year philanthropic partnerships that will provide the stability and capacity needed to meet the rising call for equitable arts education in rural Oregon as state funding models change.










Calm, serene forest

Curricular Example: Place-based Photography and Poetry

In March and April 2025, students learned landscape photography with Portland-based artist Mike Vos and explored nature-inspired poetry by U.S. Poet Laureate Ada Limón. They then exchanged photos with peers in other counties, writing poems inspired by one another's images. In May, the finished photo-and-poem pairings were displayed in a tri-county youth art showcase and free, public reading by Limón, connecting classrooms across Clatsop, Tillamook, and Lincoln counties in a shared celebration of creativity and place.

Nestucca K-8 School Summer Day Camp

In partnership with Nestucca K-8, Sitka hosts a free summer day camp for up to 100 K-8 students. Held during four weeks in July, the camp offers four days of immersive arts and nature programming each week, connecting youth with professional artists through hands-on projects and outdoor exploration.

2025 Camp - "Nature, Innovation and Impact"

Youth engaged in bookbinding, digital photography, felting, poetry and mask making, exploring personal connections to nature. 


2025-27 Strategy

Sitka's 2025–2027 K-8 Create strategy balances coastal growth with capacity building for long-term sustainability. Year 1 centers on listening, evaluation and capacity building, while Years 2–3 apply these insights to guide thoughtful expansion and strengthen partnerships within and beyond our nine-district footprint.

With the loss of a major federal funding stream and more changes underway in Oregon's state funding for K-8 education, securing multi-year philanthropic partnerships will be essential to sustaining access for the 5,000 rural students currently served through K-8 Create, and to building momentum toward statewide solutions and impact.
